

WHAT IS THE HERITAGE INITIATIVE?

The Heritage Initiative is a broad community project asking our neighbors in Minnesota and Wisconsin's St. Croix River region if a National Heritage Area would be a good fit for our area. The Initiative seeks to identify shared stories and special places, discuss benefits and challenges, and ultimately decide whether or not to pursue Heritage Area designation.

What is a National Heritage Area?

A National Heritage Area recognizes a region's important contributions to America's history and culture and celebrates its stories, conserves its special qualities, and helps promote economic growth. Heritage Areas are designated by Congress and are planned and managed by citizens, community leaders, and public and private organizations.

Where?

The Heritage Initiative study area includes 11 Minnesota and Wisconsin counties and communities along the St. Croix and Namekagon rivers, and the other major rivers and lakes that flow into them. Ultimately, the stories our region has to tell and the level of community interest would determine the boundaries of a Heritage Area.

Public Involvement

Community meetings around the region will start in early 2012. Beginning at the same time, you can visit the Heritage Initiative website at stcroixheritage.org to share your stories and participate in the discussion.

These types of projects, and many others, are some of the many ways that National Heritage Areas across the country help residents and visitors celebrate their culture and history, ultimately benefiting their regional economies.
